COMPREHENSIVE PLAN OVERVIEW

What is a Comprehensive Plan?

- 20-year plan to articulate a community vision through a series of goals, objectives, policies, and actions that guide the day-to-day decisions of elected officials and local government staff. - MSRC
- Guides a community's development over the long term and describes how the community's vision for the future will be achieved.
- The Growth Management Act (GMA) requires that the fastest-growing cities and counties complete comprehensive plans and development regulations to guide future growth and, if necessary, revise their plans every ten years to ensure they remain up-to-date



★ Starred counties are partially planning under the Growth Management Act






UNIVERSAL DESIGN BACKGROUND

- SSHA3P Executive Board Resolution No. 2024-07
 - October 4, 2024
 - What it says:
 - Recommendation that member governments incorporate into the Comprehensive Plan
 periodic update the following goal/policy or one similar: "Increase the supply of housing
 accessible for people of all ages, sizes, abilities, and disabilities by incentivizing the
 construction of housing designed with universal design principles."
 - Also includes narrative pieces to include in the Comprehensive Plan to provide context for the goal/policy
 - The purpose of this recommendation is to increase the supply of housing that is accessible to people of a wide range of ages, sizes, abilities, and disabilities.

This will be the 3rd presentation for Advisory Board input on the development of the 2026 State Legislative Agenda. This presentation will review the Advisory Board input receive at the June 17, 2025 and July 15, 2025 meeting, and three items that the Advisory Board identified as potential priorities for the SSHA³P 2026 State Legislative Agenda.

The Advisory Board may consider action to recommend the Executive Board include certain priorities in the 2026 State Legislative Agenda.

MAJOR THEMES: JUNE 17

- Ownership opportunities with focus on barriers for households with disabilities
- Mixed-income housing and public funding (e.g. social housing)
- Income discrimination for those on fixed incomes / disability
- Tenant screening and credit scores
- Alignment between funders
- Encouraging condominium construction





MAJOR THEMES: JULY 15

- Mixed-income housing and public funding
- Income discrimination for those on fixed incomes / disability
- On-going funding for permanent supportive housing





DRAFT PRIORITY 1

PRIORITY: Expand Funding and Policy Flexibility to Support Mixed-Income Housing

Problem: Current state and local affordable housing funding sources and policies are often restricted to serving only households below certain income thresholds, limiting their use in mixed-income developments that can foster economic integration and project viability.

Proposed Legislative Priority: Modify statutory and administrative requirements for public affordable housing funds, such as the Housing Trust Fund and local sales tax for affordable housing, to allow a portion of units to serve moderate-income households (e.g., households earning 80-120% AMI) and/or households of any income level, when included in mixed-income developments that also serve low-income households.

Impact: This change seeks to encourage financially sustainable housing developments and allow public dollars to better leverage private and philanthropic investment while maintaining a strong commitment to deeply affordable units.





DRAFT PRIORITY 2

PRIORITY: Create a Statewide Enforcement Mechanism for Source-of-Income Discrimination in Rental Housing

Problem: Although Washington law (RCW 59.18.255) prohibits landlords from discriminating against tenants based on lawful sources of income, such as housing vouchers, disability benefits, or child support, there is no dedicated state enforcement mechanism. As a result, violations often go unreported, uninvestigated, and unaddressed, leaving renters, especially low-income and disabled households, vulnerable to undue housing instability.

Proposed Legislative Priority: Create an enforcement system to ensure meaningful implementation of source-of-income discrimination protections. The system may include:

- Designating the Attorney Generals' Office with authority to investigate complaints and bring court action.
- Funding for local fair housing organizations to assist with complaint intake, investigations, education, and legal advocacy.
- Annual reporting and data tracking to monitor complaint and enforcement trends

Impact: A coordinated enforcement framework seeks to deter unlawful behavior by housing providers, and ensure that Washington's Source-of-Income anti-discrimination law is adequately enforced.





DRAFT PRIORITY 3

PRIORITY: Ensuring Operating Support for Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)

Problem: PSH is a critical component of the housing continuum, serving our most vulnerable, lowest income community members and because of this service to our most vulnerable, PSH developments lack the ability to respond to unanticipated increases operating and maintenance costs. These developments need long-term funding commitments for operating and maintenance, and service funding to support vulnerable tenants. Without these commitments, the viability of the developments is at risk.

Proposed Legislative Priority: Ensure operating support for permanent supportive housing.

Impact: Ensuring long-term operating and maintenance investments ensures the long-term success of PSH projects, prevents housing loss for the most vulnerable.
